For Those without the Luxury of Taking Clean Clothes for Granted

lean clothes. A washing machine. A clothes dryer. Most of us take these things for granted in our daily lives. Some of us probably view "doing laundry" as a chore to be tolerated. But many people in our community do not have the luxury of grumbling about this chore. Instead, they wonder whether and how they're going to be able to get their clothes clean. Laundry is one of the essential services that the Lamb Center provides for its homeless guests. Week in and week out, Monday through Saturday, two shifts of volunteers from numerous faith-based organizations serve in the Lamb Center's laundry room. For years, volunteers organized by Emmanuel have staffed the Lamb Center's laundry room every Saturday afternoon and every third Saturday morning of the month. In addition, several from Emmanuel take on additional shifts on weekdays and other Saturday mornings.

The laundry process is deceivingly simple. Guests drop off their dirty clothes and then volunteers wash the clothes, dry the clothes, fold the clothes and prepare them for pick-up. But laundry service is so much more. Often guests are dropping off the only clothes they own besides what they are wearing. Often, laundry contains clothes a guest needs for work the next day. Sometimes dirty laundry is filled with the clothes of children. Sometimes, clothes are soaking wet because of a recent rain, or frozen stiff because that soaking rain was followed by sub-freezing weather. Sometimes laundry is filled with dirt from



the ground where our guest slept the night before. Laundry is something very personal and many guests provide special instructions: please use bleach; please don't use bleach; please use a detergent for sensitive skin; please make sure my clothes are completely dry because damp clothes are uncomfortable in cold weather; please have my laundry ready for my next 6:00 AM work shift.

Terry and I joined the team to provide laundry services to the Lamb Center guests a couple years ago. We serve on the morning shift every fourth Saturday of the month. The universal emotion that each guest expresses when they drop off and pick up laundry is sincere and heartfelt gratitude. We feel privileged and humbled that we can play a small role in helping to provide an essential service to the local homeless community who do not have the luxury of taking clean clothes for granted.

Bible and Bacon Women's Group— Our Story and an Invitation!

t started with a morning shower and hasn't stopped yet...at least thirty-five years and counting.

Longtime Emmanuel member Shirley Gibbs was in the shower when she realized that what this church needed was a Bible study for working women, for those who just couldn't make it from Monday to Friday. There were several Bible studies for women, but they didn't work for Shirley or a number of her friends. But Saturday was doable. Saturday morning study meant meeting early, sharing breakfast and Bible study and then being off to youth sports or family activities—all by 10 am. Definitely doable.

And thus, was born Bible and Bacon, a Bible study hosted in Shirley's home and based on a structure and lessons published by Women of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Today the lessons and other wonderful material are available to members each month in Gather magazine. The Bible in the name...obvious. The Bacon...a hearty breakfast."

"I used to think it was a dumb name," one member said, "but now I kind of like it. It is old fashioned but it's a link to our past. Besides, we call it B&B most of the time."


Over the years, the study moved around a bit and one capable leader after another took over including Pastor Renee LiaBraaten and for the last roughly 20 years, ELC member Cheryl Gallagher.

Many of the original B&B'ers are now grandmas but still gather on Saturday mornings. We've added new participants along the way (being a mother or a grandmother definitely not a requirement) and even welcomed back some long-distance friends now that we're Zooming (Florida and, temporarily, Hawaii). "When the happy time comes and we don't have to Zoom," one member said, "we're going to try to do it anyway. We don't want to lose those who have reconnected!" Not a few of us miss the breakfast in this age of Zoom. But we can still share our opinions, pray together, and experience fellowship.

How has this group hung together for so long? We asked each other that very question recently and here's what we figured out.

Church women of any age or level of knowledge are welcome to join B&B, leader Cheryl Gallagher says. One member shared that "I originally joined because no prior biblical knowledge is required."

Several B&B'ers like that the lessons are structured so "you can participate even if you didn't have time to prepare."



"And there's no judgment," said one member. "We want to hear what you have to say. "Sometimes we may seem to go off track," Cheryl says, but that's a good thing if we're exploring something we want to talk about. "We're allowed to take the study discussion where it needs to go, Spirit-led, even if we don't 'complete' the lesson. We've been told our study is appealing to younger participants because of our collective, hard-earned wisdom."

Over the years, since Shirley Gibbs first had the idea for this Emmanuel sisterhood, it has evolved into an action group that tries to live the lessons of the Bible. It contributes money to community endeavors, sells Fair Trade items supporting the small farmers of the world, as well as olive oil produced by the Arab and Israeli women of the Middle East. We also form teams to support Emmanuel activities like Lenten and Hypothermia Prevention meals.

We pay tribute to our founder, Shirley Gibbs, who died June 13, 2020. Shirley was right. Emmanuel needed a Saturday morning Bible study for women and this is it.

n 2004, a show appeared on PBS to capitalize on the recent trend of reality TV shows, with a twist—17 American and British applicants were chosen to experience five months of living in 1628 on the site of an actual early American colony. the very beginning, we learn how sexism, racism, economic motivations, and religious intolerance are baked into our country's origins. 
Estate Planning 101: What You Need to Know!


